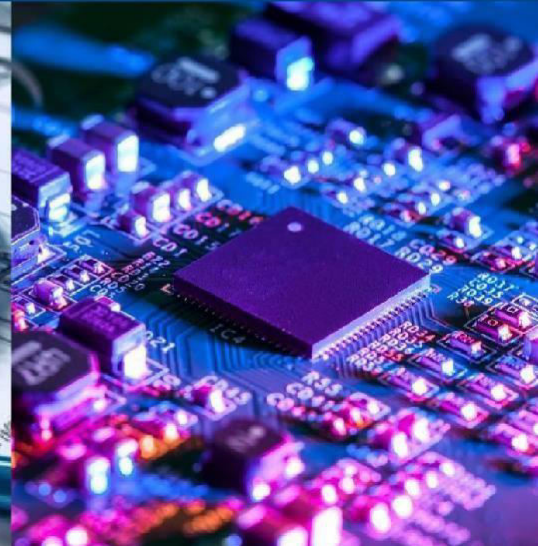


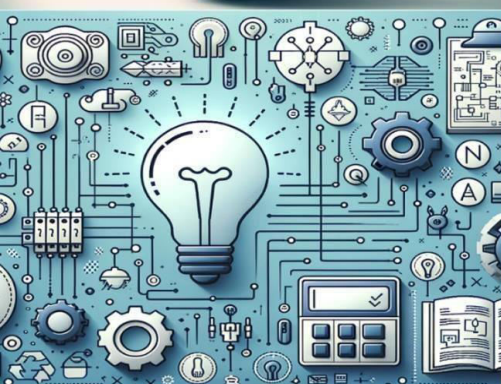


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Nationalism in the Thought of Swami Vivekananda: Philosophical Foundations and Contemporary Relevance

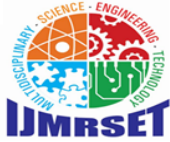

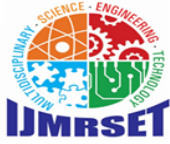
VI. VIVEKANANDA'S VIEWS ON GLOBAL BROTHERHOOD
